#### Youth Police Academy

On the week of June 20, 2022, Officer Sears held a "police academy" for youth at the public safety building. The week included exposure to the department's different units and functions as well as a physical agility test. A graduation ceremony for the attendees was held June 24.



## Felonious Assault

On June 8, 2022, a security officer at Great Lakes Crossing Outlets reported that he had been assaulted with a knife by a mall shopper with a knife. The security officer had approached the customer, a 32-year-old male from Lake Orion, because he was in the mall after hours and walking a dog inside. After security asked him to leave the mall, the suspect pulled out a knife and walked toward security while making verbal threats. The Oakland County Prosecutor's Office authorized charges for the suspect for Felonious Assault.

## Terrorist Threat

On June 13, 2022, Officer Brehmer was dispatched to Jabil Circuit at 3800 Giddings Road for an employee who had been terminated and was refusing to leave. When we arrived, the employee, a 26-year-old female from Auburn Hills, had left the property. We were given information that she told her coworkers that she should get her gun then "shoot the place up". Officers Brehmer and VanLandeghem went to the suspect's residence to follow up about the threat she made. They located a pistol and a loaded magazine inside the suspect's car. The suspect was placed under arrest and physically resisted our officers. The Oakland County Prosecutor's Office authorized charges for the suspect for False Report of a Threat of Terrorism, Carrying a Concealed Weapon, and Resisting Officer.

## Home Invasion

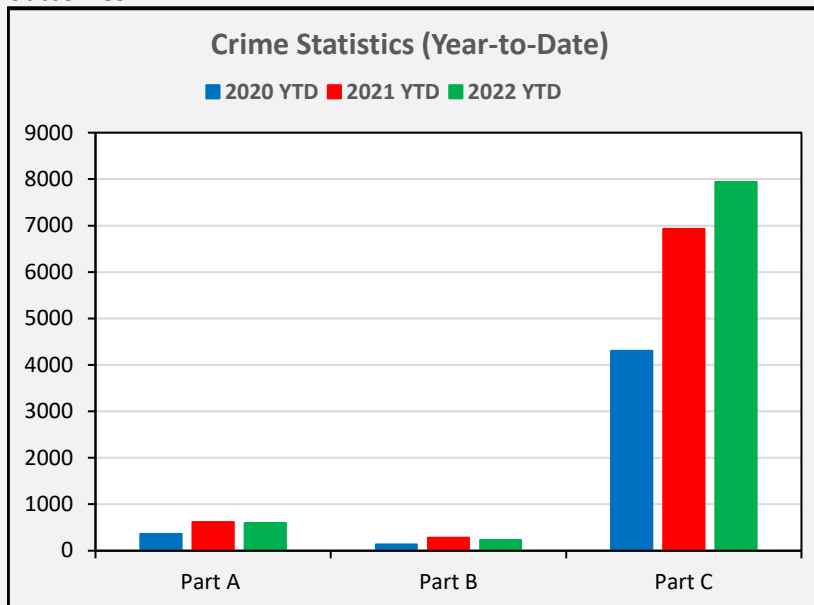
On June 25, 2022, officers were dispatched to a vacant residence at 2311 Dexter Road. The house is in probate due to a death in the family; the caller said that nobody should be at the house. Sergeant Peters, Officer Smith, and Officer Brasil found the house to be occupied by a 34 year old male and a 38 year old female, both homeless. The house was littered with drugs, drug paraphernalia, and tools which were later determined to have been stolen. The occupants had even gone grocery shopping and stocked the kitchen with food. The Oakland County Prosecutor's Office authorized charges for both of them for Home Invasion.

## Domestic Violence

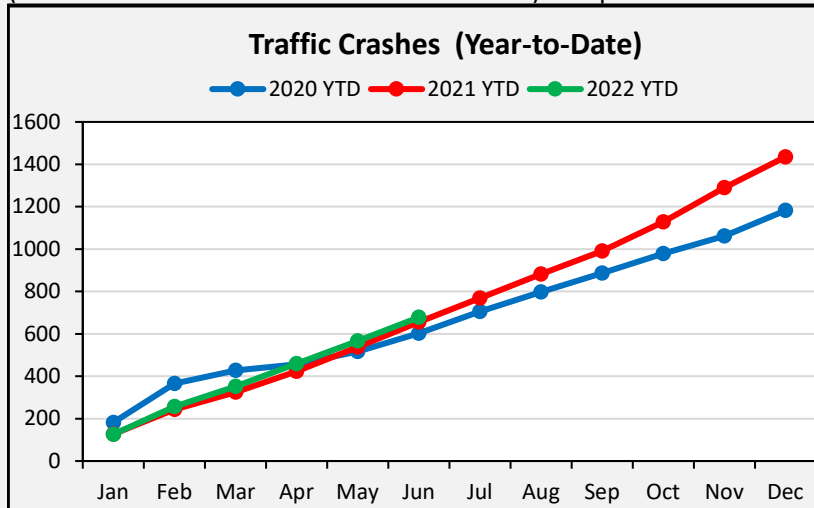
On June 5, 2022 around midnight Officers Jackson, Saikalis, and Bryant were dispatched to the parking lot of Westbury Village for a report of a child standing outside with a bleeding face. Investigation determined that the 12 year old child's mother struck him in the face and grabbed him by the neck. The child was treated for his injuries at a local hospital. The Oakland County Prosecutor's Office authorized charges for Domestic Violence.

## Crime and Service Statistics

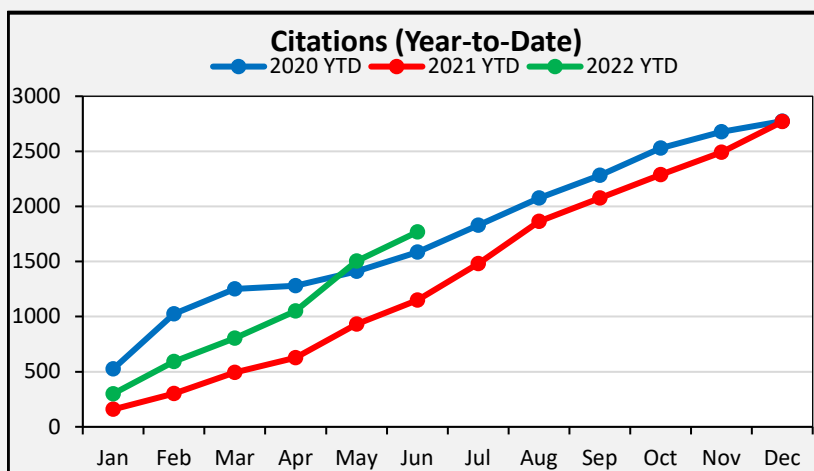
We continually strategize our responses and make the best use of the tools and personnel we have to produce the best possible outcomes.



Year to date we have experienced a 3.5% decrease in Part A incidents (more serious offenses), an 18% decrease in Part B incidents (non-violent misdemeanors), and a 14.6% increase in Part C incidents (misdemeanor and service-related incidents) compared to 2021.



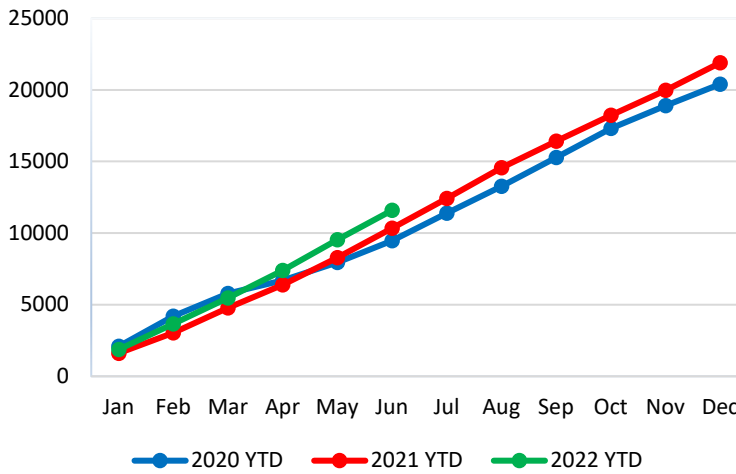
During June, we handled 111 crashes. Year to date we have experienced a 3.5% increase in traffic crashes compared to 2021.



Officers issued 265 citations in June 2022. Year to date we have experienced a 53% increase in citations issued compared to 2021.

## Calls for Service

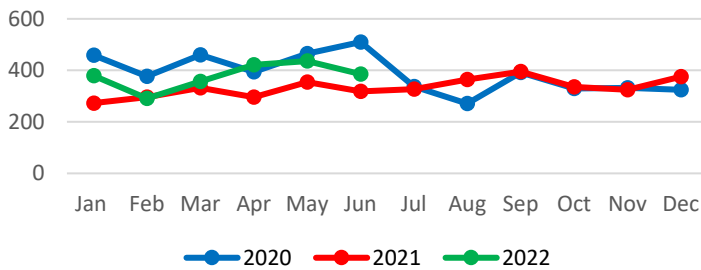
### Calls for Service (Year-to-Date)



Officers handled 2052 calls for service during June. Year to date the department has handled 11,589 calls for service, which is a 12% increase compared to 2021.

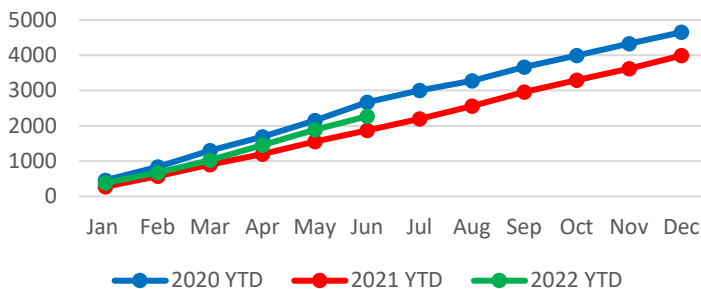
## Time in Neighborhoods

### Cumulative Time in Neighborhoods (Year-to-Date)

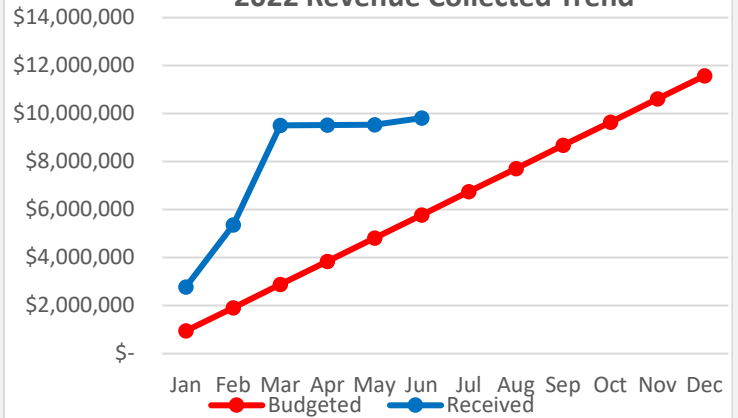


Year to date we have spent 2270 hours in our neighborhoods, which is a 21% increase compared to 2021.

## Financial Reports

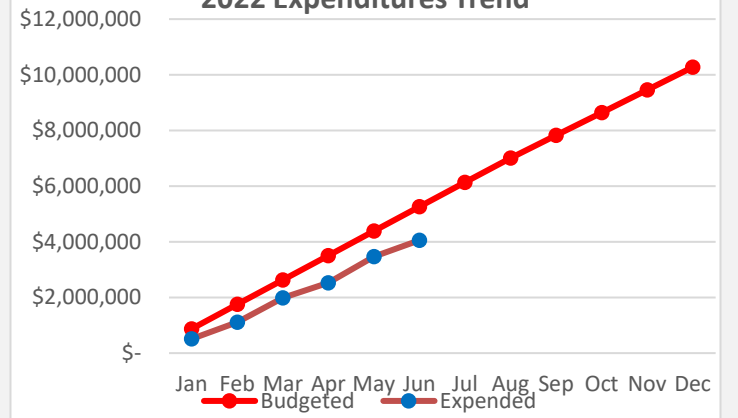
We continually analyze our department expenditures to ensure we remain within our approved budget, while delivering the best possible service to our community.

During June, we received \$276,123 in revenue. Year to date we have received \$9,815,986.

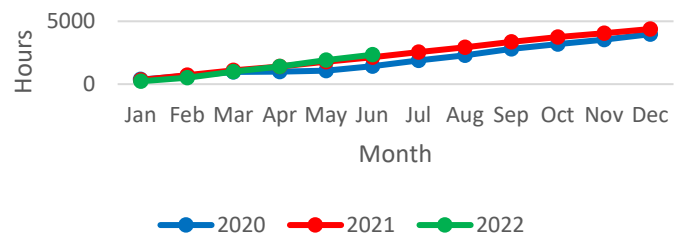
### 2022 Expenditures Trend



During June, we expended \$586,316. Year to date we have expended \$4,056,585 or 37% of our approved budget. We are currently \$1,203,860 under budget as of the end of June 2022.

Officers worked a total of 434 hours of overtime in June. This is a cumulative year to date increase in overtime of 191 hours compared to this same time last year.
